Dear Prep Students,

The St. Joseph's Prep English Department hopes this message finds you in the middle of a good book. Speaking of good books, we are excited to inform you of the English Department's Summer Reading Program for 2011. This year we are issuing you a **required reading**. In the last week of classes, you will receive your own copies of *The Other Wes Moore: One Name, Two Fates*. You are to read this non-fiction memoir over the summer. Note that on your Prep account, you will find a charge of \$11.50 for this book, a reduced price from the usual \$15.00 for the book. We thank you for your support in this regard, and think that you will agree with us that this book is a worthwhile investment of your money and your time.

Indeed, in the time you spend with this *New York Times* bestseller, you will likely find yourself engaged in a memoir that is rich in struggle and searching on the part of author Wes Moore. I know that in my reading, I found it fascinating (if not altogether serendipitous) that it is another man of the same name who helps the author discover a bit more about himself and the intricate interplay of his past, present and future. Our author Wes Moore is a Rhodes Scholar, decorated veteran, and White House Fellow. Our other Wes Moore is not a Rhodes Scholar or White House Fellow. He is a veteran of prison, a convicted murderer. Interestingly, these two Wes Moores grew up in the same Baltimore neighborhood. And there you have it: *One Name, Two Fates*.

As you learn how these two men meet and get to know each other, you may also learn something about your own journey, something about decisions and choices, luck and fate. Like me, you might also discover something about the power of relationships, or the power of the pen and the sword. Hopefully you and a parent or friend can talk about the book together and maybe even find more similarities than differences between the two Wes Moores and yourselves.

Once you return to school in September, we will assess you in our English classes. You can prepare for this assessment by reading the book and reflecting on the questions attached to this letter. While you do not need to submit any work in response to these questions, you will need to be prepared to respond to the questions and discuss them in class. You should thus take notes on the reflection questions at home before you return to school.

I am excited to announce that On October 6th, author Wes Moore will visit St. Joe's Prep to speak to the community about his journey in writing and living. We hope you can attend this evening's talk, part of the Prep's Taggart Cultural Series. I would like to extend a big thank you to Ms. Judy Christian and the Taggart committee for inviting and welcoming Wes Moore into our school in the fall.

Finally, in addition to this new twist to our Summer Reading Program, we also are providing, as we have in the past, a list of our favorite books to you and the entire Prep Community. This list is again available at www.sjprep.org (a hard copy of this list is also attached to this letter). When you arrive at this homepage, head over to the "Summer Reading" tab on the left and you'll be all set with the books each English teacher has loved reading this year. While we do not *require* you to read these books, we do hope that you read one or more of them, and pour yourself a glass of lemonade while you're at it.

Please note that extra credit is available only to incoming freshmen this year
